# FROM KRISTEN

Two years ago, Wendy Steele, the founder of the global Impact100, visited Queenstown and inspired an interest in starting New Zealand's first Impact100 chapter. The concept was simple: encourage at least one hundred women to give \$1,000 to a charity with a project that would make a substantial and meaningful difference. In the twenty years since the formation of the first Impact100 chapter, more than \$105 million has been donated to charities and we were eager to bring her concept to the Wakatipu. Not surprisingly, her vision and passion for philanthropy translated well in our closely knit community.

Taking Wendy's lead, we proudly recruited 152 members in our first year. Our members ultimately granted \$120,000 to five inspirational charities while the additional funds we raised were put on reserve for the following year. Our main grant recipient, Living Options, used their \$100,000 donation to renovate a home in Arrowtown for individuals with developmental disabilities. Their facility is the first of its kind in the Wakatipu and a valuable addition to our community.

This year, we surpassed our already high expectations, enrolling 177 members. In November, at our annual gala \$200,000 will be

donated to deserving charities in the Wakatipu. Our five finalists this year include Central Lakes Family Services, Kiwi Kit Community Trust and Volunteer South Partnership, Pivotal Point Charitable Trust, Routeburn Dart Wildlife Trust and Southern Wellbeing Trust. Our grant committee chaired by the experienced and excellent leadership of Joan Kiernan, was pleased with the diverse range of impressive finalists. The grant process is the heart of the Impact100 effort while providing a helpful window into a better understanding of the needs of our community. Each of the projects chosen could easily qualify for the \$100,000 grant. Fortunately, we will grant a second project \$85,000 while the three runner-ups will receive \$5,000 so no charity will walk away without a grant.

It has been a great pleasure to be Impact100 Wakatipu's first chair. I am constantly inspired by the incredible generosity of our members and I am greatly appreciative of their tremendous support. Together, we have already made a big impact in our beautiful community and I look forward to many more impactful years ahead.

Since its inception, Impact100 worldwide has donated more than \$90 million to worthy causes and has mentored dozens of chapters from start-up through maturity.



Impact 100 was founded by Wendy Steele in 2001 in response to feeling as though women's roles in philanthropy needed a new way to be expanded and encouraged. Wendy launched the organisation with the goal of empowering women to see themselves as activists through utilizing large grants to make an impact within their communities.

By 2002, Impact100 received nonprofit status and donated its first grant of \$123,000. In 2003, People Magazine published a story about Impact100, and Wendy's idea quickly began to spread. Today, her model has been replicated in cities all over the world and only continues to grow.

## 2020 WINNER

#### Living Options



We recently caught up with our 2020 \$100,000 grant winner Living Options and their facility on Nairn St, Arrowtown. Renovations are nearly finished and they hope to support people with disabilities and their families soon. Olivia Wildey reports that it has been a real community project with suppliers offering discounts, and in some cases free items for the build.

Queenstown philanthropy group Impact 100 voted on the recipient of \$100,000 in late 2020 their choice, from a strong short list, was Living Options.

The donation is a high point in a 20year journey that has seen Living Options founder Alison Wildey and her daughter Olivia fight the "invisibility" that society can inflict on people with disabilities.

## 2020 RUNNERS UP

#### Wakatipu St John

Wakatipu St John used the \$5,000 donation to help with the running costs of their health shuttle. The shuttle runs to Invercargill and back daily to take people to medical appointments. It is a free service (although many do make a donation to help cover costs) and is well used by residents of Queenstown. The running costs include fuel, maintenance and costs associated with the volunteer drivers (training, police checks, uniforms etc).

**Baby Box** 

With the \$5,000 donation, Baby Box has been able to fund more contents for the baby boxes. \$5,000 is roughly the equivalent of 20-25+ baby boxes going out to new families in our community. They are in the process of putting

together a large-scale survey and review of the baby boxes from those that have received them in the last 3 years – initial feedback is overwhelmingly that items such as the merino sleep sack and the locally handmade knitting and quilts are the most appreciated by the families.

Demand for baby boxes continues to grow exponentially - and Baby Box are on track to give out over 40 boxes in the coming month alone.

#### Turn Up the Music

When Turn Up the Music's "Play.Music" initiative was shortlisted for Impact 100, with the guarantee of a \$5,000 donation, the Trust decided to invest the funds in videography and a written guide to showcase the vision, purpose, teaching method, and wellbeing benefits of Play.Music.

This underpinned Youthtown's decision to commit \$50,000 in 2021 to expand the number of participating primary schools in Queenstown and to pilot "Play.Music" in primary schools in Christchurch and Oamaru and on the West Coast. A 10-fold return on investment.

#### Wastebusters

With \$5,000 from Impact100
Wastebusters were able to deliver, in

partnership with Sustainable Queenstown, an additional pop-up repair event for the Queenstown Community in June at St Margaret's Prespyterian Church in Frankton.

Repair Cafés are free pop up events where people bring damaged belongings and local volunteer experts sit down with them and do their best to repair them. They are about connecting people with others, saving money and reducing the amount of material that ends up in our landfills, with the aim of changing the way people use and dispose of resources.

On the day our volunteers fixed 63 items, including a holey rocking horse and a saggy armchair that belonged to the last gold miner in Arrowtown! 100% of people said they "loved it" and most



took away some simple repair skills to try

A few comments received through their feedback form:

## 2020 EVENTS

Events are a big part of what we do at Impact100 and there are three key events each year. The first in June reveals how much money we have gathered in donations to grant, the next to announce and meet the final five charities in October and lastly the gala dinner in November when we hear from each of the five charities and members vote to determine who will receive the grant money.

Alongside this are smaller events for members to meet and connect, such as gallery events, meet and greets, and breakfast meetings. This creates opportunities to meet other women in the Wakatipu, who are community minded, social, and like to get involved.

#### The Big Reveal

"The Big Reveal" Generously hosted by White and Wongs was our first ever members event in June 2020 where Kristen announced 151 women had come together for Impact100 Wakatipu in its first year.









#### **Final Five**

The Final Five event in October held at The Homestead Lake Hayes. Joan Kiernan the Grants Committee Chairperson announced Baby Box Trust, Turn Up the Music, St Johns, Wastebusters and Living Options as our Final Five for 2020.

More than \$650,000 in endowment funds invested with Craigs IP, from giving people for the benefit of the Wakatipu Community.
